Facebook

Create Facebook Groups to share advice, events, links, notices, pictures, and videos, all without having to “friend” students on their personal accounts. Groups may be public or private, and can be used to support bar takers, current students, specific classes, and more.

Blogs

Blogs reach students without access to Facebook, and while blogs support the same types of media, they offer more text formatting options. They also often include tracking software that helps monitor the effectiveness of your blog.

YouTube

YouTube’s Annotations software allows users to create interactive links between videos. For example, students can click an answer in a multiple choice question that leads them back if that choice was incorrect; trial advocacy scenarios show students how different questioning styles might play out in a real courtroom; etc.

Google Docs

Collaborate with students as you all edit the same document together in real time. This is a great way to help students understand the flow of IRAC and the importance of organization in their writing.



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
